Dear Flyway Festival Friends, Fans, Sponsors Exhibitors and Field Guides,

Today is the day that I have set aside to share with you, the happenings of the year and to wish you a marvelous holiday season and Wintertime. Here is what I thought I would do to get myself in the mood to chat about our upcoming Flyway Festival. I grabbed my computer and purse AND the dog and tripped out to the street to hop in my car and head into the local wilds like I have found works best for me to center on our wilderness (wild near us) and direct my thoughts to you my wildlands community from whom I receive my inspiration and who I cherish, so.

Life has other plans. The car will not start. I was going to switch to the good old Toyota pickup and when I turned the key, the new battery was completely dead. So, back into the house I trapzed to make a cup of coffee and regroup. Settled in the car with my Merlin Bird ID App scanning the nearby trees, for the voices of songbirds, the front seat pushed back with



my computer propped on my steering wheel, I'm going to give a first draft of my love letter to you, a go.

First, let's review the last year and a half. You will recall that in February of 2023, we held a darling and triumphant Flyway Festival on our home turf in the heart of the historic shipbuilding area of Mare Island surrounding by drydocks and buildingways with cranes and gantries towering overhead. That was a fun weekend packed with fondest of memories of wild times shared together as we celebrated the return of migrating waterfowl,

shorebirds, hawks and songbirds who have visited, overwintered, refueled on our shores and Bay since the beginning of time.

Together, we have thrilled at the glimpses of nature viewed up close through a field guide's fancy scope or by holding binoculars to our faces, to see the flitting source of a song or sound, we had really not paid attention to, before.

One time a year, we have set aside to gather and celebrate the beauty and bounty in which we live. This has become a treasured tradition. As we

gather to learn, to experience, to share and to rejuvenate our commitment to protecting what we hold most dear. Our wildlands and open spaces.

Fast forward. Things are inexplicably shifting in our lives. Like dozens of



earthquakes, some where we expected them, least. "Storm events" morphing into tornados. Tumultuous times in our communities that tumble us into despair, distress and yes, disbelief. I am going to tell you of one such 'storm event" in our lives. Before I do, I want to remind you and assure you that while all this tumult swirls around us, may we (Continued, next page)

never forget to step outside, to look to the night sky saturated with stars, or the day sky of bluest blue, billowing with clouds. May we look to the earth beneath our feet. Not just watching as we place one foot in front of the other. but as we look ahead to the way before us, along a trail leading us to a distant hillside and soon, to a mountaintop and glorious vistas that transform us. May we go to the water's edge where our sorrows and sadnesses are always melted away and washed out with the tide and the ripples of fast flowing water. Nothing really changes about the great outdoors. It's our experience of it.

So, having reminded you that like today, when the blowing, piercing tule fog still blankets our town with chill, there is a sun right above, tussling with the fog, for a chance to warm us and remind us, as we come close to the shortest day, that the light will return. We can weather all that buffets us. I know it is so and I believe that you do, too.

And, like magic, right before my eyes, the wind shoves the fog clouds away and the blue sky appears with its shimmering veil of high clouds glinting in the midday sunshine.

So, having I hope, inspired you, I am, as promised, going to ask you to sit down with me so I can tell you about the changes we are experiencing.

First, my Nitro died on the night of November 1st. He has been our dog rock and joy mixed with a good dose of trouble, for 11.5 years. He convinced us to not take ourselves too seriously and that the bond between dogs and humans is as assured as migration. As I read the literally more than a thousand heartfelt tributes and condolences. it was clear that dogs are very much emissaries and ambassadors between all that is wild and us. I read stories of Nitro guiding people he did not know into the wilds of Mare Island. Dogs remind us that even we are wild and to dive on into the depths of that part of us. Its OK to be freely human.

Now, not only have we lost our mascot dog, we have

lost our San Francisco Bay Flyway Festival as we have known it for 28 years. A weird and almost inexplicable twist has occurred for our 2025 Flyway Festival. In 2023 it had been 3 years since we had held an In-Person Wildlife Expo traditionally headquartered on Mare Island and we were so excited to hold a LIVE EVENT that February.

Unbeknownst to us. BIZARRE things would begin to take place. Shortly after that fun 2023 Flyway Festival, a cabal of actors planned a stealth takeover of our traditional and beloved Flyway Festival. This is why as I planned the 2024 Flyway Festival, I was nonplussed about the lack of support I was receiving from the various partners which led me to cancel the 2024 Flyway Festival to regroup.

Imagine my shock upon learning that a group from the now former State

Senators office, the Vallejo City Managers office, and its Mare Island partner, with a contracted event company which the City of Vallejo City Manager entered into an agreement with in August 2023 to put on a number of events in Vallejo, were joined by representatives from agency and nonprofit organizations, all of whom began holding private meetings in January 2024 to create and produce a "NEW" birding event modeled after ours.

At first I was told they planned this "replacement" Birding Festival because I "quit". Clearly, this was NOT in response to my heartfelt letter canceling our 2024 event, but due to advanced planning to virtually steal our event headquartered on Mare Island for 28 years. They are making good on their plans. They have masterminded an event to take our Flyway Festival's place literally one week before ours, and enticed many organizations who were our partners to join them. WOW! Stealing a California Secretary of State registered non-profit business' key event! Unbelievable!

Yet, our friends are urging us to hold the San Francisco Bay Flyway Festival, anyway.

So, like the migration that never fails to take place, we will continue our migration celebration here on the north shore of San Francisco Bay, the way "we" do it. For our 29th season, we'll just "wing it"! Let's see what we will share together this year for our beloved Flyway Festival. I can tell you this. We are a hardy lot. You come to the Flyway Festival with many expectations. We can assure that the Flyway Festival will take place regardless of the weather. Only heavy rain cancels our guided outings. This year will be in many ways like in the past. No heat, but lots of warmth!

Please join us February 7, 8 and 9, 2025 when we will once again celebrate the migration of as many as 1 million shorebirds, a quarter million waterfowl, ducks and geese, and likely tens of thousands of raptors, hawks and millions of songbirds, to and through San Francisco Bay. Isn't it so magical that we live nearby to these gatherings on the waters and in the sky at our national wildlife refuges, state wildlife areas and local wildlands parks?!

As the weeks unfold, you will learn of plans we are making to host you in this year's Go Wildly Live **Outdoors Flyway Festival.**

Our "Go Wildly Live Outdoors Flyway Festival" is Dedicated to the Life of Larry Broderick, Our Birds of Prey Guide and Friend

I'm devastated. My dear friend and a friend to the San Francisco Bay Flyway Festival, Larry Broderick. died of a heart attack the morning of New Year's Eve, 2025.

We were planning that he would guide a first ever birds of prey hike at the Mare Island Shoreline Heritage Preserve at this year's Flyway Festival.

He started coming to our birdwatching Festival as a young man and dreamed of guiding hikes featuring his beloved raptors, and THAT HE DID!

I remember calling him one year to let him know I had a carload of birders running late for his Lynch Canyon birds of prey hike. First, I was amazed that his cell coverage was good enough to receive my call from the Mare Island Flyway Festival headquarters and then, that he actually answered his phone in the field!

When I told him this group was on their way, and asked if they would be too late, characteristically, I now have learned from his close Team who helped him lead the hikes, he wasn't grumpy or upset, as more than one field guide has been over 30 years.

Instead, he said so excitedly, "I have 92 people already! I'll wait for them."

Many guides would be flipped out by that size turnout and even refuse to auide if I didn't limit the number on their tours, require preregistration and really discourage, rather than encourage everyone to participate. They were known to even lock the gate and leave people behind who had maybe gotten lost or stuck in traffic. I don't mean to be rude. I'm just saying that Larry had a radically different style. Larry was obsessed with "inclusion", not "exclusion". I was told recently, by a bird watching enthusiast who has been one of Larry's closest colleagues, that they actually assigned themselves to seek out new people who had not been on one of Larry's hikes and beginning birdwatchers and stayed with them throughout the many miles of some of their hikes. Like John C Robinson, the African American Biologist and book author whose

mission is to inspire African Americans to get out into the outdoors through birdwatching. John told me when he guided for the Flyway Festival with equally large numbers, that he looks around for people with scopes and asks

them to take some of the group under their wing. Larry pre-planned dividing the large group into smaller groups assigned to guides he had recruited. These are the giants and the true leaders in my business. The business of sharing our reverence and awe for the natural world around us, with anyone and everyone. I have often been guilty of cajoling and of course, resorting to story-telling to engage those I am convinced must know nature like I strive to.

Larry, Larry, Larry. What will we do without you? Your wife and three young boys. No. I AM DEDICATING THIS YEAR'S FLYWAY FESTIVAL IN YOUR HONOR, MY DEAR FRIEND.

We'll still do that hike at the Mare Island Shoreline Heritage Preserve in your name. I promise. As raptors begin to be seen in the trees and the sky, I will speak your name. Maybe by then, you'll be able to join us in the sky because

you will have earned your wings, precious friend. I have no words. Only tears. RIP Larry Broderick.

Yet, it is only quite recently that I have discovered a new and deeper understanding of wilderness(wild near us) through a more

intimate and personal engagement with the natural world around me. More and more, I am becoming interested in the "edge" of land management. And, I am immersing more in the natural world just outside my back door, in my alley, through early morning jaunts with the dog, she most interested in squirrels and me, obsessed with the Merlin Bird ID App. Let's talk and learn together about

Stan Clark is a Vallejo-based creator of the remarkably gorgeous Astro Botanicals, the glowing art that has adorned our Flyway Festival for nearly 20 years. They have claws, spines, horns, scales, tails and fangs." He mentions three categories of his stuffed toys. Mountain dragons and jungle dragons and sea dragons.

Before Stan made his magical large scale "Inflated Sculptures" art featured in shows all over the US, he designed and sold stuffed animals. Not your

ordinary stuffed animals. Join Stan Clark and Myrna Hayes for a rare moment when we join in conversation about his artful animals as you hold one in your arms. Stan has made and sold as many as 3,000 of these one of a kind creations. Now, he doesn't sell them, preferring to design and sew each one as personal magical and mysterious wildlife friends who you will meet and hold.

"all these things are broken" — In his sixth book of poetry, j.lewis tackles the challenges of dealing with mental illness, both as a father and as a Nurse Practitioner.





Take a drive and then walk at Huichica Wetlands and nearby Hudeman Slough a couple of miles further West along Ramal Road. Both areas are part of the greater Napa-Sonoma Marsh Wildlife Area Complex overseen by the CA Department of Fish & Wildlife. Huichica Creek Wetlands and Hudeman Slough are hotspots for wintering waterfowl, shorebirds and raptors. A description from a previous Napa Solano Audubon Society guided outing, says, "Many interesting birds have been reported in these wonderful birding areas. You are likely to find Sora & Virginia Rails, Northern Shoveler, Pintails, Greenwinged and Cinnamon Teal, Redheads,

Western & Eared Grebes, Double-Crested Cormorants, American White Pelican, Dunlin, Western & Least Sandpipers, Black-Necked Stilt, and American Avocets. Raptors observed at these locations include: Northern Harrier, American Kestrel, White-Tailed Kite, Redtailed Hawk, and occasionally Bald Eagle, Peregrine Falcon, Merlin, Feruginous Hawks, and Short-Eared Owls. Bonaparte's Gull and Forster's Terns are regular winter visitors. A number of passerine species and Great Horned Owls frequent the marshes and Eucalyptus Groves. One year there was a Red-necked Grebe and several Red Phalaropes at Huichica.

Directions: Huichica Wetlands. Heading North on Highway 29 from Vallejo, turn left and head West on Highway 12/Sonoma Highway for approximately 2.4 miles to Duhig Road (next to the Domain Carneros Winery just past the light at Old Sonoma Road). Turn left on Duhig Rd. and head South approximately 2 miles to Las Amigas Road. Turn left and head East approximately 1 1/4 miles to Buchli Station Road. Head South on Buchli Station Road approximately 1 mile to the very end past the winery then along a dirt extension to the parking lot just over the railroad tracks.


